## Key Knowledge

- When clay is wet, you can mould it into the shape you want to.
- When clay dries, it becomes very hard and solid and you cannot mould it anymore.
- When clay is dry, it is a good time to paint the clay.
- You have to be very careful when creating smaller features with your clay. You can even use some tools!
- It is a good idea to design your sculpture, before beginning to actually sculpt it. This will give you a good idea of what it is going to look like when it is finished.
- You have to be patient while the clay dries, it can take at least 24 hours to dry!
- Clay can be pinched, rolled, cut, or built up in layers to form shapes of all kinds.
- Clay baked, or fired, in an oven becomes especially hard and can last a very long time.
