## Positive Impact of Great Attendance -

Children who attend school regularly keep up with school work well. This impacts very positively on their overall social, emotional and academic development.

Teachers plan carefully ensuring lessons build on what has been taught previously. Being in school consistently means tomorrow's lessons are more meaningful and easier for the children to access. There is a proven correlation between positive attendance and good achievement.

Data from 2019 shows that 84% of Key Stage 2 pupils who had 100% attendance achieved the expected standard in reading, writing and maths.

# **Curriculum & Extra-Curricular Spotlight**

### 'Wonder'ful Writing

In English children in Upper Key Stage Two have been reading and studying the moving and touching novel 'Wonder' by R.J Palacio. The book tells the story of August Pullman, born with a facial difference that, up until now, prevented him from going to a mainstream school. Starting 5th grade at Beecher Prep, he wants nothing more than to be treated as an ordinary kid—but his new classmates can't get past Auggie's extraordinary face. Wonder, begins from Auggie's point of view, but soon switches to include his classmates, his sister, her boyfriend, and others.

Through the study of this book children have developed their knowledge of Treacher-Collins syndrome (TCS) alongside thoughtful consideration of the range of feelings and emotions experienced by August and all those who loved him through his school journey. The children have produced excellent non-chronological reports about TCS.



### **Cycle Awareness Training**

We were delighted to welcome back colleagues from North Yorkshire 'Bikeability' this week. Bikeability is the government's national cycle training programme. It helps children learn practical skills and understand how to cycle on today's roads equipping them with the skills and confidence to cycle on today's roads, Children undertake two days of training beginning on the school grounds building skills and confidence. Following a competency assessment, they progress to cycling on local roads to develop their knowledge and skills of how to navigate these safely.








### **Young Leaders Award**

We are delighted to be delivering the <u>Archbishop of York Young Leaders Award</u> programme to a group of our Year 6 children. They meet every Friday after school. The Young Leaders Award (YLA) is a fully resourced leadership and character education programme that helps children realise their potential as leaders challenging them to 'be the change they want to see'.

Each week the children look at and explore different leadership skills and qualities building their knowledge and complete individual and community challenges as they work towards achieving their award.







The cup challenge really made the young leaders think about and develop team work and communication skills as well as the balance leaders have to find of stepping forward with ideas and as well as listening to and include others.

### **Personal Social Health Education PSHE**

Children in Key Stage One have been thinking about the importance of sleep as part of a healthy balanced life.

They have been learning the key vocabulary from their word organiser as well as thing about the different bedtime routines that help them get ready for a good night of sleep.



### **Spring Term Competition Series**

We were delighted to continue our weekly involvement with the Sporting Influence competition series on Wednesday after school. This week was the turn of children from Year 5&6 to take part in dodgeball. The team played incredibly well together supporting and helping each other.

Very well done to Grace was awarded a wrist band for respect for the way she showed respect to her teammates sharing the ball and including everyone.



#### **Collective Worship**

This half term our worship theme is, Courage.
This week we listened to the story from the Bible of Daniel and the Lions. We learnt how Daniel gained courage from his faith and prayer. He used this courage to stand true to what he believed even when those around him did not agree. We thought about young people who have stayed true to their beliefs such as the environmentalist Greta Thunberg and women's rights campaigner Malala Yousufzai.

### **Shared Learning**

We are blessed to have a dedicated and expert staff team at St Peter's who work incredibly hard for the children at St Peter's and beyond.

Shrove Tuesday falls during half term this year so our traditional pancake stall and pancake races will value place Friday 9 February 2024 at 3.15pm



## Ripley Cricket Club are recruiting new players for 2024.

Ripley is a vibrant, inclusive cricket club and we are in our 11<sup>th</sup> year delivering junior cricket section. We operate 4 adult teams and have 11 junior teams across all age groups in the Nidderdale Junior League.

We are now recruiting new players in school years 3, 4, 5 and 6. And for the first time, we will have a girls only teams too!

Pre-season training takes place on Friday's in the sports hall at King James School, Knaresborough from  $23^{rd}$  February to  $22^{nd}$  March (inclusive) and  $5^{th}$  April at the following times:
